Introduction_

umter School District will implement a standards-based report card for grades K-1 during the 2017-2018 school year. Second grade will be added in 2018-2019. The report cards will provide information for parents/guardians regarding their child's progress toward mastery of the South Carolina standards.

Standards-based reporting enables teachers to communicate clearly about each individual's progress. With this system, parents/guardians will know how their child is progressing toward mastering standards in each subject. They will receive detailed information about their child's strengths and weaknesses in a subject area as opposed to a single letter grade for each subject.

Parents/guardian will receive four formal reports during the year detailing student progress toward mastery of the standards. Teachers will use rubrics created by the standards-based report card committee to ensure consistency in how students are assessed across the district.

What are the advantages?

- Ensures consistency of expectations among teachers
- Focuses on standards from the beginning of the year to ensure that students have the opportunity for additional support and/or challenge based on their progress
- Aligns assessment, instruction, and reporting
- Identifies the child's specific strengths and weaknesses
- Outlines expectations for each grade level in advance

Why is there a need to revisit our report card?

- To provide more information to students and parents
- To provide information in a meaningful way
- To share information in a clear and concise manner
- To provide a fair and consistent grading framework
- To ensure all grading and reporting is aligned with South Carolina standards

What does a standards-based report card provide?

- Clearly defined learning targets/standards
- A focus on mastering content standards instead of accumulating points
- Measurement of a student's progress toward mastery
- A report of what students know and are able to do
- Information based on a balance of formative and summative assessments
- A record keeping system that informs instruction
- A system that encourages student reflection and responsibility for learning
- Separation of achievement from effort/behaviors

What is not included in standards-based academic grades?

- Effort
- Participation

Extra Credit

- Citizenship
- Attitude
- Behavior

How do standards-based report cards compare to traditional report cards?

Traditional

- One grade per subject
- Based on percentages
- Grade calculated using an average
- Behavior, work habits, effort often part of the grade

Standards-based

- Grade for each learning goal/standard
- Use of a rubric to report on level of mastery
- Emphasis on more recent evidence (trends)
- Use of summative assessments to grade (tests, portfolios, projects, performance tasks, etc.)
- Based on state standards
- Academic performance only
- Behaviors reported separately

Grading should:

- Be fair
- Be consistent
- Support student learning
- Promote communication among teachers/students/parents

Grading practices are related to the following learning goals:

- Identify critical concepts
- Assess individual concepts
- Set mastery as the standard
- Utilize formative and summative activities
- Provide multiple opportunities to demonstrate learning
